The DeFalcises are the first American breeders of the Bergamascos and started the Bergamasco Sheepdog Club of America. There are now four approved U.S. breeders in the club,

Last year it was recognized by the American Kennel

Club, said Donna. "This breed is over 2,000 years old. It's an old soul breed with an absolutely wonderful temperament," she said. "They go with the flow of the family. Your energy level is their energy level."

Like many herding dogs, they're incredibly bright and capable of a complex vocabulary, said Donna.

"They respond

better when you speak in full sentences," said Donna. "You need to explain, give them a reason

for why or what they're doing." They're also great around children, intuitively knowing how close to get, which has made for great therapy dogs in her classroom, she said.

"Just yesterday I had an autistic student and my female insisted on lying next to him. He kept pushing her away. Eventually he got tired and she just stayed there with him," Donna said.
